But this year it was especially poignant as, whilst we celebrated with our lovely young people we were also aware of the plight of the children in Aleppo and in the Yemen. So many children were injured, starving and losing out on an ordinary peaceful life. I have a feeling of great thankfulness today as I sit down to write this article because the news is that there is finally an evacuation of the families in east Aleppo and they can escape at last.

I believe we all hope for a new year that brings peace in the areas which have been at war for years. We are glad at Christmas to welcome the Prince of Peace and I pray that his peace will begin to reign over the world in 2017.

And, as we look toward next year here at home, there are many things to look forward to. There is a whole new year of Open the Book (OtB) for our team. We go into the schools regularly and act out bible stories for and with the children. Our team is strong but if any parent feels they would like to join us – or want to find out more about what we do, please let me know. The commitment is a light one and can be as little as one or two sessions a month between 8.30am and 10.00am. I promise you that, if you become an OtB team member you will really enjoy it – we have a lot of fun.

Another event we are looking forward to is the Reedham Passion Play on Good Friday afternoon. We are performing it at outdoor locations in Reedham and raising money for the East Anglian Air Ambulance. We still need one or two young men to act as disciples but, apart from that, we have a great production team and we look forward to an excellent event which we hope you will all enjoy.

Reedham Parish Council

Meeting held on Monday 7th November 2016 at Reedham Village

Hall - There were 11 Councillors present and the Clerk. Also present was County Councillor Iles. 9 members of the public were in attendance. The Council meeting commenced at 7.30 pm.

The Vice Chairman Derek Mills tendered his resignation from the Council as he will be moving out of the village shortly. This will leave a vacancy on the Council. If anyone is interested in applying please contact the Chairman David Hale or Clerk Claudia Dickson.

County Councillor Iles informed the meeting a decision on Devolution will be taken by Norfolk County Council on 21st November. The Government is insisting that Norfolk and Suffolk have a Mayor, which Norfolk do not want.

He also reported that the Broads Authority will reinstall the steps and bridge if a way can be found for the permissive path to be reinstated.

The closure of the permissive path was again discussed. The Council are working hard with the landowner, Norfolk County Council and the Broads Authority to try to find a way to get it reopened.

The Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, Chris Bradbury, gave the following report:

There are no issues with the play equipment following the inspection in November. They are still waiting for the installation of fibre optic broadband from BT. Unfortunately the underground wiring duct is blocked but they do have permission to dig up the car park to hopefully clear it.

A new BBQ was purchased in time for Bonfire Night.

A caravan club used the field in half term week and had use of the Hall for a Halloween Party.

The AGM is on Monday 28th November and all are welcome.

Fund raising:

The October bingo jackpot was not won and therefore now stands at \pounds 250 in 55 numbers or less.

The new Jungle Book, shown on 26th October, was only attended by 18 people, and Absolutely Fabulous has had to be cancelled as they could not get the film for the right night.

The psychic medium evening with Steve Gill made a $\pounds 110$ profit and he has been rebooked for April 2017.

A Christmas Quiz is being held on Wednesday 14th December.

Bonfire Night was well attended. The bonfire was able to be lit this year as the wind was in the right direction. The band Power House played music outside before and after the fireworks, which was very popular. Thanks were given to the James boys for another spectacular display.

Further comments:

Several objections were raised to the planning application at 12 New Road on over development grounds but a majority of the Councillors had no objections.

The Council is to buy 2 round picnic tables for the play area.

BT are consulting on the closure of underused phone boxes, including the one on Riverside. The Council will object on the grounds of poor mobile coverage.

Meeting held on Monday 5th December 2016 at Reedham Village

Hall - There were 9 Councillors present and the Clerk. Also present were County Councillor Iles and District Councillor Nurden. 2 members of the public were in attendance. The Council meeting commenced at 7.30 pm County Councillor Iles informed the meeting the Devolution deal has been withdrawn. The Broads Authority will reinstate the steps and bridge to the permissive path if and when an agreement can be reached with the landowner.

District Councillor Nurden let the Council know the garden waste renewal has been extended as the service has gone out to tender. They are looking to procure a new contractor in conjunction with another authority.

The closure of the permissive path was again discussed. Mr Chris Mutten, the landowner, attended the meeting to give the Council a detailed history of the permissive path and his views on a way forward.

Further comments:

There were no planning permission applications for consideration.

Concern was raised about the state of the water hole at the allotments.

Councillor Chris Ward was elected as the new Vice Chairman of the Parish Council.

The Council is to replace the steps along the Woodland Walk, with tenders being sought for the work.

It was agreed to maintain the Precept at the current rate.

BT have withdrawn their proposal to close the phone box on Riverside.

Nature Notes

A reminder that the Big Garden Birdwatch is from $28^{th} - 30^{th}$ January. If you haven't yet taken part, this is great fun. You just need to spend one hour over that weekend seeing how many different birds come to your garden (or park or green space) and how many of each kind you can see at one time; and then send in your results. For further details see <u>https://ww2.rspb.org.uk/get-involved/activities/birdwatch</u> or in the papers or TV guides. This makes an invaluable contribution to knowledge about our bit of Planet Earth!

To get the most out of it, start feeding your birds now, so they want to come to your garden. What they will most appreciate are seeds, chopped apples, cereal, cake and biscuit crumbs, raisins, meal worms, bacon rind, nuts and cooked potato. They will love fat balls too – but please don't use the ones in mesh – little feet can get caught in the mesh, and the plastic just adds to increasing mess and pollution as it won't rot down. Niger seeds are also very popular around here with goldfinches. Bread is not such a good idea, as it contains little nutrition and tends to attract rats and mice. (Sadly, this applies to feeding our local ducks^{*}) Don't put out salted foods, soft fats (e.g. from roasted chicken), or, during spring and summer, loose peanuts (the young ones may choke!). They also need water for drinking and bathing.

Keep your feeders clean by washing them (outside) in warm soapy water and mild disinfectant, and letting them air dry before refilling – best done every few weeks to stop the spread of bird diseases. And wash your own hands well after handling the feeders!!

* Try instead corn (canned, frozen or fresh), duck pellets (sold online and at pet stores), lettuce, other greens (torn into small pieces), frozen peas (defrosted), oats (rolled or instant) or seeds (including birdseed or other varieties).
