From the Rectory

Behold: I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?

So the Lord, speaking through the prophecy of Isaiah, attempted to open the minds of his exiled people to the possibility of a return to their homeland. The exiles, presumably, hadn't perceived it. It's the task of a prophet to enable people to see what they don't readily see.

When Russian tanks rolled into Ukraine, most people probably thought that the country would soon be overrun. The Ukrainians, under Volodymyr Zelensky, saw things differently.

A Roman Catholic commentator was advocating the place of religious representatives at the recent COP 27 climate change conference. She said there was too much emphasis on the use of facts to try to persuade people to act. If humans were completely rational beings, facts would be enough: an algorithm designed to produce a rational response to climate change would have acted long ago. But we are not: we are driven (or not) by a range of attitudes, beliefs and emotions. Faith operates in just such a zone.

The 8th prophet Isaiah of Jerusalem, from whom the book takes its name, tried to get people to see that their corrupt ways were at odds with the holiness of the God whose favour and protection they relied on; seeing from a distance the ultimate fall of the kingdom of Judah. When that occurred, another prophet (or prophets) took up the mantle of Isaiah to persuade the exiles that God had not deserted them and would restore them. The book deploys imagery, poetry, symbolic action and significant names to open minds and kindle imagination; to see the consequences and possibilities which open up when you realise that God is with us (= the name Emmanuel).

The power and (sometimes disturbing) beauty of these words were not just for their own time. God remained with his people: many prophecies gained a new significance in the coming of Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the Branch of Jesse, the Righteous Lord, the Suffering Servant. Handel's *Messiah* draws heavily on them; there are a few in the service of *Nine Lessons and Carols* from King's College; but our abbreviated parish versions cut most of them out. This year the Benefice Choir Carol Service (22nd Dec at Beighton) is set up as a dialogue between the prophecies of Isaiah and the nativity in Luke's Gospel: I hope it's a stimulating and attractive pairing.

But it's not only in hearing the Christmas story that we need to have our minds opened to see the realities and possibilities which come when we realise that God is with us still. In the face of climate change, pandemic, recession, God can still do a new thing with us. Will we not perceive it?

The triangle in front of the church can hold several cars if drivers pull on to it nose-first. This would leave the road for those less able to walk on rougher ground. I've asked the local farmer to mow the grass when dry enough to keep it short and dry as possible. Unfortunately the ground does hold the water so can be rather slippery for cars if drivers are not careful.

'On the 22nd December, I've also asked the farmer if we can use the brick barn on the corner of Cox Hill Rd and Acle Rd for parking. It's a short walk up the hill to the church so best for those able to walk well. This will leave more space on the green triangle for the congregation and less-abled choir members to park. The church path will be lit but torches will be useful for those parked at the barn – not much street lighting in the wilds of Beighton.

In 1956, Reedham was one of 300 locations nationwide selected to take part in a survey of how dialects differ across the UK. The researchers interviewed 3 older gentlemen, George Browne, Ernest Newman and Bob Ewles, whom no doubt some of you will remember. They recorded their speech patterns, analysed how they pronounced certain words, and compared different dialect words. Now the project is back and wants to learn about dialect words in our village. Obviously, there are more incomers in 2022 than there were in 1956, but they are interested in **all** words – which words newcomers adopt, which words newcomers share and how language evolves and changes as we are exposed to different people, different cultures and different backgrounds. This is partly because Superdrug have changed from using Terracycle to another company to recycle them, but also because some of the branches were overwhelmed. Diana Gilder has contacted Superdrug direct and they are trying to sort the problem out.
