The harvest of many crops is complete; for some, like sugar beet, it's just beginning. For many wild creatures, too, autumn is a time of plenty, with berries and seeds, or large populations of prey. It's a time to prepare for the winter to come: caching food, laying down fat, securing a good winter territory, finding a good hibernation site.

This remains true for human subsistence farmers in other parts of the world: the fruits of harvest need to last many months. Commercial farming and global trade mean that most of us don't have to worry about storing up for the winter to come. But there will always be adverse seasons in our lives for which we might prepare now.

Most people think it's a good idea to save money for retirement and for our final years when we may become more dependent. But there are other preparations we might make: are there things other than work, or less active pursuits which will sustain us? Do we know how to slow down? Can we cope with not being needed or no longer being independent? Have we made provision for when we die? For the Christian, the whole of life is, in a way, a preparation for death — or rather, for what lies beyond that final hibernation. Lay up for yourselves treasure in heaven, taught lesus.

But prior to that there will be other wintry periods in our lives. Hopefully not as severe as that experienced by Terry Waite, kept hostage in Beirut. Denied books, during the first year of his solitary confinement he was sustained by what he could remember of the prayers, poems and prose he had previously used and read.

There is much in Christian faith, in the words and stories of the Bible and the prayers and tradition of the Church, which can act to sustain us through difficult times: assuring us of the continuing love of God; helping to take a heavenly perspective and to keep things in proportion; showing us that suffering can be redeemed and good come out of evil; and that (as revealed to Julian of Norwich) in the end, *All shall be well*. But if we wait until we are in trouble we may not know where to turn, or be in a position to hear the wisdom. It's far better to digest these truths in times of plenty, building up a personal conviction, an inner resource. Reading the psalms each day, for example, invites me to enter the breadth of human experience, including suffering, persecution and separation from God, even if that's not where I am at that point in time: laying up a store against the inevitable winters to come.

The Bishop of Norwich

After 20 years in the post, The Rt. Revd. Graham James will be retiring early next year. The process to appoint a new Bishop is already beginning. This involves collaboration between the diocese and the national church. We already have in the Diocese a 'Vacancy-in-See' Committee. Its role is to draw up a description of the diocese, a sense of the vision we are working to and the challenges we face. Out of these we are invited to set what we believe are the qualities we need in our new bishop. Representatives of our Committee will then join 6 national representatives on the Crown Nominations Commission, led by the Archbishops of York and Canterbury to consider candidates. The name of the preferred candidate plus a reserve will be forwarded to the Prime Minister and then the Oueen before the announcement can be made.

Anyone wishing to put forward their own views about the challenges and qualities, and suggested candidates can do so through writing to a member of the Vacancy-in-See Committee – details on the Diocesan Website.
