From the Rectory

A phrase that's been coming into my head recently is 'not leaving anyone behind'. One of the heartening things about the national and local response to Coronavirus has been the sense that we are all in this together. Given that the virus and the associated restrictions affect people in different ways, this has involved recognising that some have needed particular support – and the authorities and local communities have responded. In the local church, as I've posted material on our website, as we've developed worship by *Zoom* and held some meetings that way, I've remained conscious that there remain those without the technology necessary to participate. The risks associated with distributing material on paper (including this magazine) have been a serious drawback; but I'm glad to say that everybody I've spoken to appears to have been linked-in in some way – usually through the thoughtfulness of a neighbour or another church member.

The two biblical stories which come to my mind are Mary and Joseph inadvertently leaving the boy Jesus behind in the temple; and the parable of the lost sheep. By today's standards, Jesus' parents appear negligent; but in those days of extended, rather than nuclear families, it would have been easy to believe he was safe in someone else's company - and with no way of checking by mobile! In the complexities of today's world and the current uncharted circumstances, it's very easy to see how the needs of some (whether individuals or organisations) could be overlooked. It's not generally commented on, but, in the parable of the lost sheep, it's perhaps remarkable that the shepherd, having one hundred sheep, actually notices that one is missing. What happens next is one of the significant points of the parable: the lost sheep is so important to the shepherd (= God / Jesus) that he leaves the ninety-nine to fend for themselves and goes in search of the one that is lost. Everybody would expect Mary and loseph to rush back to lerusalem in search of their son; but we might well question the wisdom of the shepherd in risking ninety-nine in order to try to save one. But our wisdom is not God's wisdom; and we are made to feel foolish when we see the joy of the shepherd in finding and restoring the sheep that was lost (the other point of the parable).

As we emerge from lockdown, we still need to guard against leaving some behind. There are people still shielding or for whom getting out remains difficult or risky. There are those without local family with whom they might form a 'bubble'. As some businesses restart, others cannot. As furlough winds down, not everybody will find they have a job to return to. Efforts are being made in education to see that different age groups of children and young people are not left behind. It can't be easy. And no doubt some economic judgements will be made for the good of the majority – governments have to apply that kind of wisdom. But, Jesus' parable suggests, we are not bound by that way of thinking; and are free to respond otherwise.

Dear Norfolk Churches Trust Bike Riders, 7.

What incredible spring weather we have had and how glorious Norfolk looks, though the recent rain has been a blessing. September seems a long way away but it will come quickly and let us hope that it will bring a dwindling in the occurrence of Covid-19 and a happier time with more freedom of movement. We do hope that you, your family and friends have

managed to remain well and positive in such an uncertain time.

Some good news is that, after much deliberation, the Bike Ride committee are planning to go ahead with this year's event on Saturday 12th of September. We feel that most of the permissions are already in place in terms of moving about the county by bike, foot or car and that we have been encouraged by the Prime Minister's announcement that places of worship will start being open from 15th June. The bike ride already complies with most social distancing measures but there may need to be some additional instructions to put in place, so please do keep an eye on the <u>website</u> and emails nearer the time. The paperwork is with the printers and we hope to get it posted out in early July. A copy of the paperwork will also be available on the website.

We are very aware that churches have sadly had to cancel their summer fundraising activities and so the Bike Ride could be an great opportunity to raise some much needed funds for churches and the Norfolk Churches Trust. The Trust has also had to cancel the Stately Car Boot Sale and its other fundraising events and so we are hoping that we can make this a record year to provide revenue to support their grant programme for parishes undertaking essential building works in the coming year.

The Bike Ride is an ideal event for such a time - an opportunity to get out and about in the fresh air on a bicycle, on foot or in a car. It has been noticeable that a huge number of people have enjoyed walking and cycling over the last few weeks and so we hope that they can join in the bike ride and add visiting and exploring our wonderful places of worship on the 12th of September and help raise some money at the same time. Your support and participation is needed more this year than any other.

So, with the sun shining and the trees in full glorious green we plan for September and hope that you will feel as positive about it as we do. We leave you with some highlights, statistics and results from last year's Bike Ride:

The Bike Ride raised an amazing \pounds 95,037 in 2019 which was an increase of \pounds 3,541 on 2018. The number of people taking part increased by 5% to 567 and the number of places of worship receiving cheques increased from 279 to 312.

 William O'Brien was the Winner of the Prince of Wales Certificate and raised £1,375

- Mary Truman won £1000 for her nominated church as it was the most improved on 2018
- Michael and Paula were the top cyclists on their tandem and visited 62 churches
- James Akehurst was the top walker and visited 51 churches
- Hempstead, All Saints raised £4,154 and was top church this year, and Burgh Castle, St Peter and Paul, came second. Paul Nicholls doing another outstanding fundraising effort.

The £50 Prizes for the pictures the judges liked the most are as follows David Nice. Bell Ringers St Michael's, Aylsham. Lorne Inglis. Stained glass reflection at St Mary's, Burgh-next-Aylsham Roger Peacock. Spectacular tea for Norfolk Churches Trust Bike Ride participants.

Opening of church buildings during the pandemic

The opening of church buildings is being done gradually and carefully, following Church of England and <u>Government requirements</u> in order to protect all who use them and to remain within the law. Opening is subject to risk assessment. Be aware that, unlike most businesses, most of our churches are cared for and cleaned by people over 70 and therefore in the Government's vulnerable category. Not all churches will be open every day or straight away.

We will post details of when churches are due to open on the <u>calendar</u>. Note that sometimes (e.g. to accommodate a funeral service) we may need to close a church on additional days, until cleaning can take place or to be confident that any virus has died off.

Churches may now open to the public for individual prayer (only).

- Do not visit if you have symptoms of Covid-19 or if you are self-isolating or (following Government advice) shielding.
- Maintain social distancing (2 metres) and good hygiene (e.g. using disposable tissues).
- Use the hand sanitizer provided on entry and exit.
- Avoid touching surfaces, books, etc. or any leaflets unless you are taking them away with you.

- If doors are open please leave them open; if they are not open we will **9.** regularly clean the handles.
- Obey any notices (e.g. closing off parts of the church or restricting seating).
- Please leave any prayer requests for us on a piece of paper (use your own pen).

May you know the presence and peace of God as you visit and when you have left.

St Andrews Church Wickhampton is opened daily and closed early evening The PCC decided as many people have been enjoying the local area for walking and cycling during the lockdown they may value the chance to have a place for quiet contemplation and private prayer, so do follow government guidelines and use the sanitizer in the porch before and after entering.

REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL Meeting held on Monday 4th May 2020 online via Zoom

There were 10 Councillors present, the Clerk, County Councillor Brian lles and District Councillor Grant Nurden. 6 members of the public were in attendance. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm.

This was the first Parish Council meeting to be held online via Zoom. It was held in the same manner as the ones held in the Village Hall using the agenda published in advance.

County Councillor lles reported that Norfolk County Council is now mainly **9.** working from home. If residents have difficulty contacting anyone at the Council please let Cllr lles know and he will pursue it.

District Councillor Nurden reported that Broadland District Council has met virtually to agree an emergency committee which will enable to decision making process to continue as normal. Virtual planning and full Council meetings will take place in May. Help and advice for residents and businesses can be found on the BDC website.

Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury provided the following report: no play equipment safety inspections were carried out in April or May. All the play equipment and the tennis court have been taken out of use and barriered off due to the Coronavirus. All hall hire has been cancelled, also the much-needed fund-raising events, therefore there is no revenue income at present. It is uncertain when the village hall will be reopening, there will be no Dog Show in June and it is not known if the annual July Village Fete will take place.

The Village Hall Stage School Adult Drama group would have staged their show this Saturday, 9th May, to celebrate the 75th VE day - also disappointingly cancelled. In this unprecedented time we have used the opportunity to re-decorate the two dressing rooms near the stage, the Foyer, the Lounge and the kitchen. We have held 2 online virtual Quiz Nights on Facebook and YouTube, and tonight our second virtual bingo will take place to provide alternative entertainment in people's homes.

Our village hall is a community building and we are facing uncertain worrying **13.** times ahead, but we remain strong and we wish everyone to do the same.

One planning application was considered:

- Erection of 4 detached dwellings at Thickthorns, 12 Church Road, NR13 3TY, permission in principle only. The Council supported the application
- Notification of approval of the flood bank works west of the Red Mill was received.
- The Council ratified the responses submitted for the GNLP consultation.

The Agreement for the Permissive Path has been verbally agreed by all 3 parties, the Parish Council, the Broads Authority and the Landowner. The solicitors for the Broads Authority and the Parish Council are finalising a bound copy. The Council agreed that the steps, boardwalk and bridge will be constructed from recycled materials.

Work on the Neighbourhood Plan has had to cease due to the Coronavirus restrictions. The next stage, a questionnaire and consultation event, will be held as soon as Government guidelines allow.

Meeting held on Monday Ist June 2020 online via Zoom

There were 9 Councillors present, the Clerk, and District Councillor Grant Nurden. 5 members of the public were in attendance. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

District Councillor Nurden reported that Broadland has postponed charging for pre-application planning advice until 1st April 2021. Residents are encouraged to contact the Early Help Hub if they are in need of urgent assistance. Further information can be found on the Broadland website. Broadland have also set up the Covid-19 Community Heroes which recognises and celebrates outstanding individuals who have gone above and beyond during the Coronavirus outbreak. Please nominate any Reedham resident you feel has provided incredible support for the village.

The Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury provided the following report: there were no issues with the play equipment safety inspections for June. All the play equipment is still barriered off due to the Coronavirus outbreak as per the Government guidelines. However, some people have ignored the notice signs and removed the barrier tape from the play equipment. The signs and tape have now been restored. Unfortunately not everyone has been complying with the 2m social distancing rule on the playing field, the police have been notified.

The July Village Fete has now definitely been cancelled due to the Coronavirus. Still in this unprecedented time we are taking this opportunity to redecorate parts of the hall.

We are still hosting online virtual Quiz Nights and Bingo on Facebook and YouTube, to provide alternative entertainment in people's homes.

2 planning applications were considered:

- A premises licence for the Berney Arms was discussed. The Council was concerned about the length of opening hours and that the application was for the whole year not just the tourist season but supported the principle of the Berney Arms reopening.
- A Temporary Road Order for the closure of Church Dam from the 21st May to 10th June was received. This has now been extended to the 30th November 2020.

The Council agreed to support tree conservation and management work at the Woodland Walk.

There are currently no plots available at the allotments but if you would like to go on the waiting list please contact the Clerk or any member of the Allotment Association. Due to the lockdown there has been lots of hard work on the allotments and all allotmenteers are very grateful to Peter for keeping the water butts full.

Work on the Permissive Path Agreement is still ongoing. The Solicitors have been contacted with a final draft acceptable to all parties.

Network Rail will be undertaking a survey of the Swing Bridge in the Autumn. They will be looking to upgrade the electrics and mechanics of the bridge but have no plans to alter the appearance.

The Council will be replacing the noticeboard outside the Doctor's surgery with new wooden one.

A Complaints Procedure and Safeguarding Policy were agreed at the meeting. Both can be viewed on the Parish Council website.

The Year End accounts were agreed; and also a grant to the Reedham Community Association for a historic agreement to help with running costs. Payment of the recycling credits from the bottle banks at the Village Hall was also agreed to the Community Association. Please continue to use the bottle banks at the Village Hall and on Riverside as these bring in much needed funds for the community.

July in the garden and allotment

Plant your winter pansies in a seed bed into finely prepared soil and thin seedlings to 5cm apart before planting out to flowering positions. Sow Sweet Williams and Wallflowers for next year.

Dead head roses and flowers to ensure continued blooms. Pinch out side-shoots on tomatoes except bush varieties. Swede, turnips and carrots can still be sown this month.
