From the Rectory

I wonder whether January represents a return to the cold light of day after the warmth of the festivities? We strongly associate Christmas with the idea of *home*: feeling that it's only right to celebrate it in a place of familiarity and security. That's somewhat at odds with the Christmas story: Luke locates Jesus' birth 70 miles away from his parental home; and not in a place fit to call home. The great Christmas reading from John's Gospel does speaks of the Word coming and dwelling among us; but the reference is to the tabernacle: a tent which travelled with the people, not a fixed house of God. There is to be a restlessness about Jesus' ministry: *foxes have holes and birds their nests: but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head*. He is at home on the road.

At Halvergate's Carol Service, the inclusion of Matthew Guite's poem *Refugee* highlighted that, according to Matthew, Jesus and his parents were to flee the wrath of Herod and seek sanctuary in Egypt – something the church marks 3 days after Christmas Day, on the festival of the Holy Innocents. As I observed at Halvergate, the Christmas story brings out the best and worst of humanity: witnessing that human life is capable of embodying the divine; and equally capable of seeking to exterminate it. The presence of Ukrainian refugees in our own villages tells us that not everybody is able to celebrate Christmas at home – whether literally, or in the sense of being in a place of familiarity, warmth and security.

Yet Jesus is close to us in such circumstances. From the flight to Egypt to his death on a cross, Jesus displays the commitment of God the Son to dwell among us in human flesh. He didn't come to show us a heavenly home by which we can escape the responsibilities, temptations, dilemmas and suffering of this one.

Although the gospels make no further references to Jesus' birth once he embarks on his ministry, they never stray from what they have said about it. To deploy a musical analogy, the truths we celebrate at Christmas establish a home key, which continues to underpin the music, even when it modulates away; and to which the movement will return for its climax and completion.

God has made him home among us and asks us to find our home in him. Having secured the endpoints, he invites us into the New Year on a journey with Jesus of discovery, sacrifice, joy and redemption.

REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL Meeting held on Monday 7th November 2022 in the Village Hall

There were 8 Councillors present, the Clerk, District Councillor Grant Nurden, and 4 members of the public. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

Broadland District Council has a Land Owner Tree Planting Grant for up to $\pm 1,000$ for 120m worth of trees or hedgerow, or a maximum of 600 trees. See their website for details.

Norfolk County Council Children's services are currently having an Ofstead inspection.

Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury gave the following report: There were no issues with the play equipment safety inspection for November. The village hall hire charges went up a small amount from the I^{st} November, also hall membership: single £10; family £15; affiliated £20. If you wish to join you can download a membership form from Reedham Village Hall website. Fundraising:

The October Cash Bingo jackpot wasn't won. The jackpot stands for October is at £340 in 59 numbers or less. This is the highest it has ever been.

The Psychic evening with Steven Treadaway was very popular with over 80 people attending. We have booked Steven again for March next year.

Our Halloween Quiz Night was very well attended with 9 tables.

Our cinema night's attendances are beginning to grow in numbers.

Our Bonfire and Fireworks display was very busy and seemed to be enjoyed by everyone. A big thank you to Nick and Jason James for another fantastic fireworks display. It was a shame about the weather on the night.

No planning applications were received in the month.

The Neighbourhood Plan has been submitted to Broadland and the Broads Authority for pre-consultation comments. It is hoped the final consultation and referendum will be completed by the Spring. A copy of the plan can be found on the website and all residents are welcome to attend any of the meetings.

The sensor was located on Station Drive in September facing the Ferry. The average speed was 31.1mph, with a maximum of 75mph. 18,000 vehicles were recorded in 31 days.

In October it was on Station Road facing towards the station. The average speed was 28.3mph, a maximum speed of 65mph, and 13,000 vehicle movements were recorded, 412/day. Vehicle numbers are on the rise.

Please note Freethorpe have recorded persistent speeding vehicles in their 30mph zone on Reedham Road leading up to the village hall. Vehicles are regularly travelling over 40mph and one was clocked at 90mph! Please be as considerate as you would want Freethorpe drivers to be travelling through Reedham. Police are doing more speed checks in the area

Meeting held on Monday 5th December 2022 in the Village Hall

There were 8 Councillors present, the Clerk, District Councillor Grant Nurden, and 4 members of the public. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

The unofficial recycling figures for Broadland District Council for 2021/22 are 50.6%, one of the highest in the Country, with 21.4% recyclable materials, 4.6% food, and 24.6% garden waste. A bin app is being launched on the 19th December (trialling from the 12th December) which will include information on bin collection days, notifications, the ability to report problems, and a fun information game.

Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury gave the following report: There were no issues with the play equipment safety inspection for December. Fenland Leisure should be commencing work on the swings in the fenced play area, and the other small items on the play equipment, on the 18th December.

Fundraising: The November Cash Bingo jackpot wasn't won, the jackpot for October stands at £350 in 60 numbers or less. Still a record jackpot.

On Friday 13th January we have another film showing, "Mrs Harris goes to Paris", at 7.30pm This is a viewer's request.

Thank you to everyone who came to the Christmas Fayre, and to the RCA Stage School for performing a mashup of Christmas songs. Also thank you to everyone who helped on the day, and who donated prizes for the grand raffle. It was a great day with many stalls and games, and the children enjoyed seeing Santa in his grotto.

I planning application was considered:

BÅ/2022/0459/PN: proposed ARQIVA smart metering I No. omni at 13.83m, ARQIVA GPS antenna at 12.4m and ARQIVA 3G omni antenna at 3.8m on 12m streetworks pole. Proposed ARQIVA smart metering equipment enclosed to be installed on root foundation at Land at Reedham Sewage Treatment Works, Low Common. Cllr Smith has submitted a person objection to the application due to public health concerns. The Council did not wish to comment.

The sensor was located on Station Road in November facing south. The average speed was 28.2mph, however the maximum speed registered was 80mph! 17,000 vehicle movements were recorded, up from 11,000 in April 2021, which equates to 250 more per day.

Reedham Gardening Club - Jobs in the Garden for January

Plant bare-root roses, shrubs, hedging and ornamental trees, as long as the ground isn't frozen.

Dead-head winter pansies and other bedding regularly, and remove any foliage affected by downy mildew.

Check for rot on stored bulbs or tubers.

Winter prune apple and pear trees.

Sort out your seeds, throwing away empty or out-of-date packets and noting down any to buy for the coming season.

Order seed potatoes, onions, shallots and garlic bulbs for planting in Spring.
