The Rector will be taking annual leave from 10th - 28th June (inclusive) - please use the contact list above during this period.

As June begins, we switch back to reading the Old Testament in our church services. As we did 2 years ago, we will be using the so-called "continuous" option, tracing our way through a particular section of the scriptures. This year we start in the history books, with the beginnings of the monarchy in Israel, devoting many weeks to Israel's favourite king, David. Later, his son Solomon will act as a bridge into "wisdom literature" (e.g. Proverbs and Job).

Although the biblical genre is history, we're not dealing with a detailed chronology: what we have is mostly a collection of stories. These are the stories that survived – which were told and retold and later made it into the written chronicle. Many of them survived because they are good stories: there's a timelessness about their appeal and the issues they deal with, human and divine. The story of David and Goliath, for example, appeals to us because the underdog, undaunted by the challenge which confronts him, emerges victorious.

David's reign is afflicted by conflict within the royal family (sound familiar?): we see the tension it creates in him and the criticism it draws from others. The Bible isn't afraid to show us the flaws in its human leadership. While Saul stands condemned, David survives: though morally far from perfect, he remains popular and, in many ways, successful (does that sound familiar?); though he transgresses, he is shown as open to both God's judgement and God's grace. Solomon, because he built the temple and is credited with wisdom, gets a better press than he might have done – or maybe we have to read between the lines. As with any history, it's worth asking what the agenda might be of the (unknown) people who wrote, or edited, the record.

Because the books are about kings, they deal with matters of power and politics. The New Testament was written within the Roman Empire: political power lay elsewhere. But Saul, David and Solomon are supposed to be running a state under God. The Biblical history is highly ambivalent about the institution of the monarchy: it's the people's idea, not God's; the verdict is that ultimately it will lead the people away from God. But in the early days the leaders at least recognise God's authority and sometimes seek and follow his guidance. I wonder if that's true today?

New Pattern of Services

tie in with the lifting of Coronavirus restrictions). Our pre-Covid pattern was based on having two priests in the Benefice, which is no longer the case. More positively, we are providing more opportunities to worship together, with a less-crowded worship rota providing more opportunities for creativity. The basic principle (see the table below) is that on the 1st and 3rd Sundays in the month worship will be locally-based, with services in most of our buildings. On the 2nd and 4th Sundays the encouragement is to come together, with early services using the Book of Common Prayer, followed by a single I I am service at Acle, Freethorpe, Reedham or another of our churches. There will be a Benefice Service on any 5th Sunday, as before (but no longer at 10.30am).

The Benefice Council has agreed to trial a new pattern of worship from July (to

The actual cycle is a 2-month one. The smaller congregations (Beighton, Limpenhoe, Wickhampton) will host a celebration of Holy Communion once every other month; the larger ones (Acle I Iam, Freethorpe, Halvergate, Reedham) usually once each month – see *Outlook* each month for details.

The service was outdoors in good weather. We were processing during the service - round the church following the Cross carried by Peter Ledward. The Collect was: 'Almighty God whose will it is that the earth and the sea should bear fruit in due season; bless the labours of those who work the land and sea, grant us good harvest and the grace always to rejoice in your fatherly care; through Jesus Christ our Lord.'

Hand bells were rung loudly by Brenda Pawsey, Kate Ashcroft and Mary Jones 'to chase away nasty stuff'; and prayers said East: in relationship with the land; North: in relationship with other living things; West: in relationship with one another; South: in relationship with God.

Rector Martin Greenland spoke with knowledge and respect about nature and villages around and blessed the fields and the neighbourhood.

This ancient tradition of 'beating the bounds' goes back probably to Anglo-Saxon days - it was vital for communities to mark out and to remember which were 'their lands'.

REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting held on Tuesday 4th May 2021 online via Zoom

There were 11 Councillors present, the Clerk, and District Councillor Grant Nurden. 4 members of the public were in attendance. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

This was the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council and David Hale was elected as Chairman and Diane Rushbrook as Vice Chairman. The 2 Councillor vacancies on the Council were filled by the co-option of Mike Barnes and Liz Bassett.

District Councillor Grant Nurden reported that all Broadland District Council members will be getting new email addresses:

<u>cllr.name.surname@southnorfolkandbroadland.gov.uk</u>. A new website will go

live on the 2^{nd} June. Broadland and South Norfolk are two autonomous Councils sharing officers.

Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury gave the following report:

There were no issues with the play equipment safety inspection for May. The government guidelines restrictions relaxed and the village hall re-opened on the 19th April.

Fire started outside the pavilion entrance on the 2nd May. Six teenagers were caught 11. on the CCTV climbing on the roof and then starting the fire between 1:40-4:30pm. Police have been contacted to investigate the crime and will take the CCTV footage on Wednesday. Luckily no serious damage seems to have been done.

The tennis court was treated for algae and lichens on 23rd April. This is to prevent people from slipping on the court. Sadly, the tennis court net has been over tightened and the plastic coating on the net wire has been damaged. The net had been slacked off and the wire came of its windings and had to be repaired. The net handle has now been removed.

There were no planning applications received.

The speed sensor was located on The Hills by the War Memorial. The 85% centile was 23mph, with a maximum recorded of 40mph. The low average is most likely due to the number of parked cars. It is currently located on Mill Road near the school.

Please remember to keep your dogs on a lead on the Permissive Path, and under control on all footpaths around the village. All dogs should be on a lead near livestock.

The Government have not renewed the legislation that allows for Parish Council meetings to be held online, therefore, Coronavirus restrictions allowing, meetings from now on will be held in the main hall at the Village Hall. Please check the website or noticeboard for details nearer the time.

EASTER CANDLE HOLDER

Our Easter candle holder at All Saints Church, Freethorpe used to be balanced precariously on a spiked candle holder and placed on a tall wooden flower stand. Whilst Jean Thompson served as Assistant Church Warden she wondered if something more substantial could be done to make the candle safer. She discussed this with her younger son Andrew to see if there was anything he could do.

As you can see in this photograph, Andrew designed and made this magnificent candle holder made of polished metal. If you visit Freethorpe church and look closely at the candle holder you will see that the design incorporates the symbols of Trinity meaning that there is one God who exists as three distinct persons - Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The candle holder was official dedicated by the Revd Martin Greenland during the service on April 18th. This candle is lit at services for the whole of the time between Easter Day and Pentecost. It is also used for baptisms and maybe lit for a funeral, as a sign of hope of the resurrection.


