The first Sunday in June this year is Trinity Sunday. To many, most, people the Holy Trinity is a baffling concept; but at heart it is an attempt to explain what God is like. God is so much greater, more complex, more simple than us, it is not surprising that we try and fail to grasp the full nature of God.

I believe that all of us, even those who claim not to believe in God, have some sort of God factor in our lives. Who or what sets your standards of behaviour? I think many people in Britain would be surprised at the extent to which their idea of good, moral behaviour is influenced by the teachings of Christ and the Bible. We are rightly horrified by parents abusing and killing their children; but earlier religions practised child sacrifice (see the Old Testament and the evidence of archaeology); and those much-admired Romans appeared to have tolerated sexual abuse of children if they were of a lower status. In the Iron Age, the age of those gentle nature loving Druids, it appears from archaeological finds that in times of stress and disaster Kings and leaders were hacked and beaten to death and their remains buried in peat bogs; I'm sure King Charles and Rishi Sunak are glad that is no longer acceptable.

Yes, lots Christians have got, are getting and will get things wrong. No-one, particularly Jesus, ever claimed it would be easy. But the way back is always through looking at what Jesus said and did – rather than rigid rules, he laid down demanding principles. And we aren't, and should not be, on our own in interpreting how to apply them in practice – that is what the whole Christian community should be doing.

I remember a time in the sixties when it was fashionable to blame the Church for everyone being riddled with guilt. Not so many are active members of the Church now, but it seems to me we are as a society even more burdened by guilt – for what we have done to the planet, past national injustices, inequalities and prejudices we have subscribed to. It sometimes seems, as the Norfolk expression has it, we can't do right for doing wrong. All this guilt, but no forgiveness?

That forgiveness is at the very heart of Christ's message – God's forgiveness of us, and our forgiveness of others. And if we want to know what God is like – look at Jesus.



REEDHAM ECO CHURCH - BRONZE AWARD

Over the last couple of years, Reedham Church has been registered as an eco-church and we have been working at ways to reduce our carbon footprint.

This includes changing to a renewable energy supplier, using mostly fairtrade goods and eco-friendly cleaning products, reducing our paper usage, installing a cycle rack,

promoting local recycling schemes in church and in the community, managing the churchyard to encourage native wildlife, planting native trees, promoting local litter picking, twinning our toilets, supporting an environmental charity, trying to invest ethically any church funds and regularly praying about environmental

issues.

An eco-church display board informs the congregation and any visitors about how to reduce our carbon footprint. Suggestions range from changing what we eat, to reducing our internet use, to moving our bank accounts. There are lots of leaflets in church, please do feel free to pick some up.

All these actions have resulted in Reedham Church gaining a Bronze Award. This doesn't mean we shall be resting on our laurels; we're carrying on the fight to save the planet. Do join us!

The speaker at our May meeting was Cora Mullenger .

Cora is a volunteer warden with The Friends of Horsey Seals, a charity whose primary concern is leaving the seals undisturbed to get on with what nature intends for them by patrolling the dunes and by educating visitors, school children and the general public on seals at Horsey. The land at Horsey is National Trust owned but farmed by a tenant who runs the car park. Over the course of this winter, 64,000+ visitors were at Horsey, which is great many people to organise.

Our June meeting (6th June, Reedham Village Hall) is a summer social. We have organised a walk and tour of Fishley church, followed by lunch at The White Horse, Upton for Friday 9th June. Our July meeting (4th July) is a talk on <u>The World of Stinging</u> Nettles given by Fay Jones.

An audience of around 30 people was treated to a fascinating talk about Norfolk's windmills, watermills, water pumps and village signs. Our speaker, Dr Andrew Tullett, is involved in the current project to restore Stracey Arms Drainage Mill, and assists at other sites managed by the Norfolk Windmills Trust including Ashtree Farm Mill, High's Mill and Polkey's Mill on the Halvergate Marshes.

The history of ornamental village signs is believed to have its origins in Norfolk and, particularly, on the Royal Sandringham Estate, and they represent the largest free art exhibition in Norfolk and, collectively, depict the history of all the settlements in the county. Andrew estimates there are 520 village signs in Norfolk, with several villages boasting more than one sign! Andrew's father started a photographic record of the county's village signs back in the 1990s and, in 2017, Andrew took up the reins – aiming to photograph all of them – under the banner of "Signs of a Norfolk Summer".

Lift and store tulip bulbs after flowering

Give Wisteria its summer prune, cutting all the long side shoots back to 20cm, to promote flowering next spring.

Continue planting summer bedding in pots and borders.

Give container displays and hanging baskets a liquid feed every few weeks to encourage flowering.

Pinch out side shoots on your tomato plants & start to feed once the first truss is setting fruit.


Harvest salad crops and first early potatoes.

Keep an eye on garlic and onions, when the leaves start to turn yellow and die back they are ready to harvest.
