There's a point when you're growing up when you realise that some children are more privileged than others: living in larger houses, holidaying in different places. For me there was also a dawning that, although I wasn't one of the privileged amongst my peers, on a global scale I certainly was. What was that accident of birth that meant I wasn't one of the starving children in Ethiopia? Why was I growing up in England, rather than India? Later, I started to wonder why there were such inequalities in the world; coming to understand that rich countries and businesses have the power to make the rules and pursue policies which keep the poor poor; and that our higher standards of living in Great Britain might have something to do with the way we exploited the rest of the world in previous centuries. But what could I do about that? I decided I would buy and promote Fairtrade; and set up a standing order with a development charity so that some of my income would benefit the less advantaged in the world.

Something similar can be true for an organisation. The Anglican mission organisation USPG has been looking into its archives – discovering that it in its early years it owned slaves.

Revelations about the slave trade are highly disturbing – or should be. I was reading recently about yellow fever, which was active in the plantations in the Caribbean and Americas. Because West Africans were less likely to die from it, they were more desirable as workers; but because of high death rates from the gruelling conditions, a steady stream of new labour was required. Slavery existed in previous centuries and within Africa itself; but European colonial powers took it to a new level: human beings were treated as a commodity, forming one leg of the trade triangle which brought us the sugar and other plantation products we craved, and provided a route for us to export our manufactured goods to Africa, there to exchange them for enslaved people.

While we might try to shrug this off as the sin of our ancestors, it might look different to someone from the Caribbean – especially if they perceive that such past exploitation lies at the root of our privileged position today. Past events colour present politics – and relationships. USPG is in partnership with the Church of the Province of the West Indies: it's a PhD student from there who will be continuing the research into USPG's history. One step on the road to reconciliation, in any situation, is attempting to come to a common understanding of the past, appreciating how the other party sees it.

I'm writing this with the season of Lent in mind: when we acknowledge not just our personal misdemeanours, but the wider sin in which we share; when we are called to seek reconciliation with God and our neighbours; and when we need to ask ourselves, what are we going to do about it?

Parish Share is the main source of funding for ministry across the Diocese of Norwich: the final figures for 2022 have been published. As a benefice we contributed 81% of what we were asked (86% in 2021): thank you to all who give to their local church. Congratulations to the parishes of Reedham; Limpenhoe, Southwood & Cantley; and Beighton-with-Moulton for paying in full; and to Freethorpe and Halvergate-with-Tunstall for improving their position (compared with 2021).

Across the Diocese, the total was 84% of what was asked: an encouraging improvement on 2021, but still well short of pre-Covid 2019.

I understand from parishioners that if you turn up with anything other than a tiny quantity of blister packs for recycling you are challenged as to whether they all originate with you and then turned away. That's not going to help the planet. Of course, it would be great if the packaging were easier to recycle - but that's down to the drug companies. It would be good if there were collection points at the Medical Centre and Well Pharmacy: Well acknowledged receipt of my e-mail, but didn't reply. I've now contacted Veolia to see what would be required for a local collection. In the meantime, I'm afraid we will have to suspend our collection of blister packs in our local churches. But do take your own to Superdrug in Norwich or Gorleston if you can.

The Reedham Neighbourhood Plan is nearly complete and as part of the process there will be a consultation from Monday 6th March 2023 to Friday 28th April 2023. The consultation offers a final opportunity for you to influence the Neighbourhood Plan before it is submitted to Broadland District Council and the Broads Authority for examination.

There will be 2 consultation events where members of the Neighbourhood Plan group will be available to discuss the plan and answer any questions:

Saturday 18th March 2023, 10am-12pm, at Reedham Vikings Social Club, The Hills Thursday 20th April 2023, 7pm to 9pm, at the Village Hall, Pottles Lane Copies of the plan will be available at the Village Hall, Doctor's surgery, Post Office, Café, The Ship, Vikings and from the Parish Clerk. It is also available on the Parish Council website - https://reedhampc.norfolkparishes.gov.uk/neighbourhood-plan/ An online survey will be available shortly and for the duration of the consultation. Details will be published on the Parish Council website and Facebook page.

Comments can also be sent to the Clerk to the Parish Council, Mrs Claudia Dickson via email reedhampc@outlook.com or by post to 31 Mill Lane, Acle, NR13 3BJ. All comments received by 29th April 2023 will be considered by the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and may be used to amend this draft. A Consultation Statement, including a summary of all comments received and how these were considered, will be made available alongside the amended Neighbourhood Plan.

This Neighbourhood Plan builds on the Community Led Plan that already exists and contains the needs and aspirations for the future of Reedham. The difference is that this document contains planning policies, which will be used to help determine planning applications that come forward within the parish. It is therefore an opportunity to have real influence over how the parish develops in the future.

Neighbourhood planning was introduced by the Localism Act 2011 with legislation coming into effect in April 2012. It gives communities the power to agree a Neighbourhood Development Plan and is an important and powerful tool that gives communities, such as Parish Councils, statutory powers to agree a shared vision and shape how their community develops and changes over time.

The Neighbourhood Plan will be a document that sets out planning policies for the Parish and these will be used, alongside the Local Plans, to decide whether planning applications are approved or not. It is a community document that is written by local people who know and love the area. Once a neighbourhood plan has been 'made', following consultation with residents, examination, and a local referendum, it becomes part of the statutory development plan for the Parish and will be used by the District Council and Broads Authority in deciding on all planning applications in the Parish.

Finish pruning roses early in the month.

Sow hardy annuals.

Pick off seed heads on Daffodils and other spring bulbs.

Now is a good time to divide and replant perennials.

Keep an eye on new fresh growth of plants for pests(slugs & snails) and remove them before infestations occur.

Sow Tomatoes, Chillies, Peppers and Aubergines in pots indoors.

Plant Onion, Shallot and Garlic sets.

Plant early Potatoes.

Early sowing of Carrots can be set off under cloches.

Parsnips can be sown once the soil has warmed up.

Keep your plot clear of weeds.
