

### From the Rectory

What makes a village a village, rather than a collection of dwellings? So many former village facilities are now just that: the Old School; the Old Post Office; the Old Chapel; perhaps the old police house, or pub. In many cases the services they used to provide have retreated from the village scene, so that they have to be accessed elsewhere, or online (and, for most of you, I admit that includes the village priest!). So what is left? In some cases, just the village hall and the village church.

A recent report on the church buildings of the Diocese of Norwich has told us what we already know: that the long term future of many of our village churches is far from secure. With smaller, increasingly older congregations charged with their care; shrinking resources for their maintenance; and less accessible funding for their repair, local churches are under threat. How would you feel if your village church was turned into a private dwelling (unlikely); or (more likely) gradually fell into disrepair? For most it's no good looking for support from the state: like so many other rural facilities, the key is going to be support and use by local residents – for a wider variety of purposes than is generally currently the case. Our active "Friends" groups at Wickhampton and Limpenhoe are a great source of hope: enabling those who may not wish to worship nevertheless to keep their village church alive.

Over the last 150 years or so, many of the former functions of a parish church (local administration, education, welfare and charitable activities) have been taken over by secular authorities, who certainly do a more professional job; but not always as locally. Looking forward, as I write, to the Janet Church Memorial Event at Freethorpe Village Hall, I was musing that it might be a sort of secular parallel to her funeral; and the village hall the secular equivalent of the village church. Now our village halls are extremely valuable; and the volunteers who run them deserve a medal; but they are, on the whole, functional buildings. Like the other consumer products of our age, when they wear out, you try to get a new one (as Cantley is currently doing). Limpenhoe Village Hall used to be the village school; but most of its equivalents don't speak of any history or continuity much beyond the present generation. You wouldn't visit an empty village hall on holiday; or if you needed some space to reflect; or if you'd suffered some tragedy; or to remember past generations. They don't have the acoustic or architectural gualities of a church as a venue for music or the other arts - or a wedding. And, in contrast to Limpenhoe's Champing<sup>™</sup>, I doubt there would be many people booking if they were opened up for overnight stays!

Yes, our village churches are designed primarily as places of worship and buildings which speak of Christian faith: naturally, I'd want them to continue as such. But they are also repositories of a community's memories and history. The village church is almost always the oldest building in the settlement, having stood for, say, 900 years; its site is likely to be even more ancient. It belongs, in an important sense, to every resident of the parish – of any faith or none. Much of what it has to offer is intangible and hard to quantify: I would say it represents the soul of the place. It's one of the few remaining assets which still makes a village a village, rather than a collection of dwellings.

#### **Parish Notes**

From the start of this term, our primary school in Acle has become Acle St. Edmund Church of England Primary Academy and a member of St. Benet's Multi Academy Trust, a trust established by the Diocese of Norwich to hold a family of (mostly church) schools which have become academies. Although currently their schools are mainly in the south of the county, there is space for further schools in this area to join alongside Acle and Little Plumstead. St. Benet's is not heavily prescriptive where things are going well, so, apart from the rebranding, the character of the school is unlikely to change radically in the short term; but we can hope for interesting new partnerships and sources of support. Unfortunately, the new academic year is beginning without the support of a Christian youth worker, as Zosia Knight has moved on to another job. We thank her for the work she did with the children on her Monday afternoons in school and hope that Norwichbased employer ENYP can replace her soon.

It was tragic to lose Tess (Teresa) Trueman on 31<sup>st</sup> August from complications following a car accident. A core member of the congregation at Beighton Church, she was known much more widely in the churches and villages from her involvement in organisations like the Mothers' Union, Christian Link and meals on wheels; and her support of her late husband and Reader, Peter. Her funeral will be at Beighton Church on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> October, 12 noon at Beighton Church (following a crematorium committal). True to her character, Tess requested mourners to wear colourful clothes and remain after the service for refreshments in the church! Our prayers are with her extensive family.

Our Benefice Choir will again have the privilege and joy of singing Evensong in Norwich Cathedral on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> October (3.30pm): worshippers from the benefice will be most welcome. We expect the Benefice Choir Carol Service to be on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> December.

The monthly service at Swallowtail Place, Acle will be at 10.30am on Tue 17<sup>th</sup> Oct (in the Games Room) – visitors are welcome; post-service coffee is available from *Sista Barista*!

Sow sweet peas and place them in a cold frame over winter for planting out in the spring. Plant daffodil, tulip and allium bulbs in borders or naturalised in grass.

Sow broad beans and onion sets and garlic for an early crop next year.

Harvest pumpkins

By the end of October the garden is looking messy.

Autumn is a time to clear up the garden and decide which plants need cutting right back or need taking out.

Protect tender and potted plants from frost.

#### WICKHAMPTON NEWS

Repairs and renovations at St Andrew's church

At long last, much-needed repairs and renovations have been carried out at Wickhampton church. The most pressing of these was the repair and/or replacement of the aged guttering and downpipes, as water ingress has been a major threat to the fabric of the church and, of course, to the irreplaceable medieval wall paintings.

Grants were obtained from The Benefact Trust, The Garfield Weston Foundation, The Geoffrey Watling Trust and The Norfolk Churches Trust, and donations made by The Friends of Wickhampton Church and by Wickhampton residents. Wickhampton PCC are most grateful to them all, as these funds have allowed the work to be undertaken. The majority of the guttering and downpipes were repaired and repainted, and now look good as new. Numerous roof tiles were replaced and some repointing of the flint walls was carried out. Inside the church, several areas of crumbling plasterwork were raked out, re-plastered with lime plaster and redecorated, quite transforming the look and feel of this special church.

Unfortunately, these works have thrown up the need for even more urgent works to stop the Chancel wall and buttresses parting company, so the fundraising continues!
